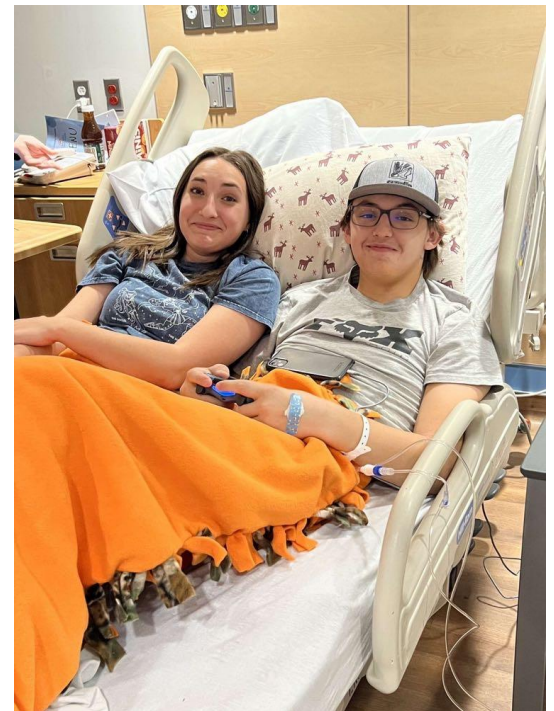


## Student Spotlight: *By Kendra Wallace*

Conner Lazzaro, a truly remarkable individual who has gone through an experience he will never forget. I had the privilege of sitting down with Conner to hear all about his journey through the unimaginable.

It all began last summer, he was working at the same farm he is currently working at now, when he slipped and hit his knee. Conner never thought anything of his knee being sore, until it continued to be a problem. His mom decided to take him to get X-rays. The doctors also thought nothing of his pain, but little did they know that their assumptions were far off. Later that night Conner and his mom get the unfathomable call. The doctor had called and stated that he was 90% sure Conner had Osteosarcoma. Osteosarcoma is a form of bone cancer that develops in the osteoblast cells that form bones. They told him it was extremely large and only less than a year old.



Conner stated to me, “ When we first got the call my mom was all flustered. The first thing that came into my mind was if I was going to die.” Words that a mother never wants to hear. I spoke to Conner’s mother about that night and she expressed, “ There were a lot of emotions that night. At first I was shocked, the doctors earlier that day joked with us that it was just growing pains. I



felt like my world was crumbling down.” Conner shared that his mother was one of his biggest supporters and never left his side.



Soon after that phone call they were back at the hospital, getting more scans and blood drawn. On September 25th of 2022, was his first round of chemotherapy. Conner had spent three weekends out of every month for his treatment. I asked Conner if he had any struggles with his treatment and he answered, “ The first half I was never sick, but towards the end of my treatment I got sick every morning. I am grateful I felt okay during my treatments.”

Finally on December 21st, he had his surgery. The doctors had taken out a 17 cm tumor out of his femur. He now lives today with a foot and a half of metal in his leg with his whole knee being made completely of metal. Soon after surgery, he began his journey of learning to walk again. All throughout his healing, Conner still continued his chemotherapy up until May 26th. Today he is now living healthy and feels like his life is back to normal. But through it all, Conner fought with unwavering strength and determination. His story serves as a reminder that even in the face of adversity, hope and strength can carry us out of dark times.
